






"Recovering Ohio's Indigenous Voices" is a public event to be held at Bryn Du Mansion in Granville, Ohio, at 7:00 on October 14, 2024, formerly Columbus Day and now nationally recognized as Indigenous Peoples' Day




- 1. Establish for artists eligibility and guidelines for assessing applications.
- 2. Identify a panel of four art and indigenous studies professionals to assess the artists' applications.
- 3. Call for Artists
- 4. Notify three selected artists, meet on zoom to schedule travel and explain details of the event
- 5. Develop and implement a marketing plan.
- 6. Provide artists with immersive tour of Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks sites and their ancestral homelands in Ohio.
- 7. October 14: Event "Recovering Ohio's Indigenous Voices "with video documentation and artist reception.



"Recovering Ohio's Indigenous Voices." is designed to reach a broad audience consisting of the general public, art students and professionals, arts and heritage educators, and cultural studies students.

The Great Circle Alliance welcomes three talented artists from Ohio's Removed Tribes, Holli Margell (Eastern Shawnee), Dani Tippman (Miami) and Travis Mammedaty (Seneca-Cayuga.) Join us on Indigenous Peoples Day 2024 as the visiting artists share their artistic practices, expressions of their tribal traditions, values, and cultural background.

- •Holli Margell (Eastern Shawnee) has sustained her tribal connections while living in Seattle. Her photography reveals compelling images of Native Americans and is reminiscent of the work of another Native American artist, Wendy Red Star, who Holli has collaborated with.
- •Travis Mammedaty's (Seneca-Cayuga) artwork tells the stories of his ancestors, using acrylics and oils to describe their cultural pathways. Since childhood Travis has participated in ceremonies in the Longhouse. He lives in Oklahoma, teaching the Kiowa language, studying Cayuga and sharing traditional singing in the Plains style.
- •Dani Tippman (Miami) embeds in her basketry the beauty and traditions she learned from her elders. She speaks about traditional native plants used in storytelling, food, medicine and technology and about traditional Myaamia life-ways, culture and history.
